EUROPEAN SOCIETY FOR BIOMATERIALS GENERAL MEETING PARIS, 5th SEPTEMBER 1985

PRESIDENTS REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

May I begin my report by welcoming you to the General Meeting of our Society. This meeting is one of our regular two yearly General Meetings where the officials of the Society report to the membership about the activities of the Society over the previous two years, where the new members of Council are elected and where any comments from the membership about the Society can be made.

I wish to start my report by looking at the Objects of the Society as laid down in Art. 4 of the Statutes where the Society undertakes to collaborate with other like minded societies, to promote scientific meetings and publications in our field, to establish specifications and standards and to encourage biomaterials activity in any other way it sees fit. I shall take these objectives and report to you on our activities under these various headings.

The European Society for Biomaterials has cooperated with a number of other Societies to organise scientific meetings since the last General Meeting held in Leuven, Belgium in September 1983, details of which are shown in Table 1.

I feel I must mention the official journal of our society, the Journal of Biomedical Materials Research. The subscription to the journal has been a part of the membership fee for the past two years, yet we still have trouble with late supply or no supply at all to our members. I visited the publishers in New York last April when I happened to be there and hoped that the difficulties had been sorted out. I am not convinced that this is the case since I am still getting letters of complaint from members. I have now written again to the publishers of the JBMR listing a number of our members who have told me they do not get the journal and hope that the problem will resolve itself in a few weeks. If the problem is not resolved satisfactorily, then the Council will consider changing to another journal, we would like to hear members views on this matter. One small

thing has been sorted out: if a member of the ESB wishes to be a member of the American Society of Biomaterials and does not wish to receive two copies of the JBMR, then the member can pay an administration fee of \$25 to the S of B, he or she will then be a full member of the S of B but the journal will be supplied via the ESB.
